OPPORTUNITY HOUSE: THE PIVITAL POINT

VOLUNTEERS HAVE BEEN AWESOME DURING THE PANDEMIC

THE PIVOTAL POINT FOR THE RECENTLY RELEASED

Opportunity House has been working in partnership with Cabarrus County, City of Concord, City of Kannapolis, Atrium Health, Daymark Recovery Services, Cardinal Innovations, AYA House, Rowan Cabarrus Community College, NC Works Career Center, Cabarrus Health Alliance and other community providers to create a plan to streamline services for individuals recently released from jail and prison to help with reintroduction into productive society and reducing recidivism. We call this process "Re-entry," and it also applies to individuals being released from mental health and rehabilitation facilities.

Because of our location, the services we already provide (meals, clothing, hygiene, laundry), and case manager on site, Opportunity House is the ideal agency for first contact to meet critical needs.

We are able to refer for medical and mental health care, substance use counseling and rehab, education and employment support, and housing. We have fluid relationships with agencies to be able to expedite these services on their behalf. At Opportunity House, we want to make sure we care for the physical, mental and spiritual wellbeing of everyone we serve, and this program is one way we are able to do that well.

To better serve individuals recently released, Cabarrus County Detention Center will, in the near future, institute a peer counseling service for inmates while they are still in jail. The Peer Counselors are provided through S&H Adult and Youth Services and will meet with inmates before release to start working to reduce barriers to success. They will then continue to follow them after release to support them as they navigate their re-entry process.

Some key partners are AYA House, RCCC, and the Stepping Up Program. AYA House is transitional housing for individuals post release from correctional and rehabilitation facilities who are in need of a supported, sober living environment. They help connect their residents to education at RCCC, employment and sobriety support groups. RCCC provides programs, some at no cost, for certifications in areas such as manufacturing, truck driving, landscaping and construction. For those who qualify, the Stepping Up Program provides services to help develop a transition plan following release from incarceration and post release services to reduce recidivism.

We are already making these referrals! Last month alone, we connected 5 individuals to services, and are anticipating great outcomes. Having these services available and encouraging participants in God's love as we make these connections really helps to bolster self-confidence and a feeling that someone believes in them, despite their past. WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

We have been giving you a great quantity of numbers that help to measure what we do here at Opportunity House. I think it would be a great time to tell you "the why." First of all, unless you look for people experiencing homelessness, you won't see them. To the average person they are invisible. They prefer it that way. It's less trouble and hassle for them. But please realize, they're there. Just because you don't see them doesn't mean they're not there. We have had 214 unduplicated individuals experiencing homelessness come through our doors. That puts us between 800-1000 unduplicated people experiencing homelessness for the year, our steady average for the last few years, just in Cabarrus County.

It seems like homelessness just happens, but it doesn't. There are root causes to homelessness. Some more whys: alcoholism and addiction, mental and physical health issues, domestic violence, past criminal records and parole issues, need for job training, and the key problem to all of homelessness, the lack of affordable housing.

The why for all of us here at Opportunity House is this: God has called each of us in a unique way to serve individuals in need. God compels us through his Spirit and what we do is for God's glory, not our own.

Our job is to keep people alive and healthy until we can help them to find the resources, medical and support agencies needed to help each individual solve their own combination of root causes that they are struggling with. We need your help.
